PI LAMBDA PHI'S NOBEL PRIZE WINNER Dr. Marshall Warren Nirenberg


In the history of Florida Delta chapter, we have never had an honor such as the one bestowed upon us this year when Dr. Marshall W. Nirenberg was awarded the 1968 Nobel Prize for physiology and medicine. He was awarded the coveted prize jointly with two other American scientists for their ingenious discovery of the method by which the genes transmit and translate the message of heredity.

Brother Nirenberg came to the University of Florida in 1945 and graduated with a B. S. in Zoology and Chemistry in 1948. In 1950, he returned to the University of Florida to receive a M. S. in Zoology in 1952. In 1957, he received a Ph. D. from the Department of Biological Chemistry at the University of Michigan.

Since 1957, he has been working for the National Institute of Health in Bethesda, Maryland. When he first started his work in genetics in 1961, he was a research biochemist in the Section of Metabolic Enzymes. Now he is Chief of the Laboratory of Biochemical Genetics.

As a result of his work, Dr. Nirenberg has been recognized as a member of eleven different societies, including the National Academy of Science and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences. He has also been honored with numerous awards other than his Nobel Prize, including four doctorate degrees and six special awards from colleges and universities, and an award from the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

It is with great pride that we, the men of Pi Lambda Phi. congratulate Brother Dr. Marshall Nirenberg on the honors that he has brought upon himself, our fraternity, and our nation.

This year, the most respected and sought after prize that the University of Florida offers its fraternities, the Scholarship Trophy, is in the Pi Lam trophy case. As a matter of fact, it has been there 39 out of the past 43 years, and there is not much of a chance of it going anywhere else in the next 43 years. This is because the men of Pi Lambda Phi are men with a brilliant future, and they start their successes right now.

Pi Lams rate in every aspect of campus life, but when it comes to excelling in the field of scholarship, Pi Lams have no equal. Specifically, it's brothers like Harold Cypress (4.0), Cliff Schulman (4.0), Jim Schram (4.0), Alan Kan (3.6), Allen Levi (3.5), Jeff Scurran (3.5), Gary Kantzler (3.4), and Jeff Fenster (3.3) who set the standards for a standard setting house. 



So it seems that this year, as in the past, Pi Lambda Phi will again show its excellence in the field of athletics.







PI LAM WINS THIRD

In the "Nose Bowl", the annual classic which supposedly determines which house has pulled the better pledge class, the Pi Lambda Phi Pledge Class of '68 emerged victorious over the TEP pledge class by a score of 25-19. This marked Pi Lam's third consecutive victory, and gave the Pi Lams a 9-6 edge in the series between the two houses.


The Pi Lam pledges, led on defense by Neal Lubow, Barry Silber, Bob Hoffman, and Rich Rivenbark, and on offense by Charley Stampelos, Bob Shack, Phil Borgia, Bob Wachholder, Steve Rokeach, Shelly Stevens, and Barry Meyerson, underwent six weeks of training in anticipation of the big game. By the time the game rolled around, coaches Nick Nicosia, Ron Gottlieb, Allen Levi, and the amazing Tony Dobies had molded the pledges into smoothly working units.

The Pi Lams took an early lead on a fleaflicker play from Stampelos to Meyerson to Shack, who took it in from the left side for the score. They followed the TD by converting for the important extra point. TEP came back to score to make the game 7-6. A quarterback sneak by Stampelos gave the Lammies a 13-6 advantage as the half ended.


The TEP pledges scored early in the second half and added the extra point to tie the score at 13-13. The ball changed hands several times with no scoring until TEP scored with less than four minutes to play. The Pi Lams started to drive after the TEP kickoff, but a TEP defender knocked the ball out of Steve Rokeach's hands on a crucial third down, forcing the Pi Lams to punt. It looked like the game would end with TEP in possession, but alert play by the Pi Lam defense returned the ball to the Pi Lams with less than two minutes to play.

Pi Lam quarterback Charley Stampelos remained calm under the pressure as he steadily moved the team downfield. With less than a minute to play, a scoring strike to Phil Borgia in the end zone tied the score.

The game entered sudden death overtime, and neither team was able to move the ball on its first set of downs. On the first play of TEP's second set of downs, linebacker Rich Rivenbark picked off a pass and glided untouched for 45 yards into the TEP end zone for the score, winning the game for the Pi Lambda Phi Pledge Class of '68.







ALLEN MICHAEL SODEN-OUTSTANDING SENIOR BROTHER 1968 - 1969


