

"That all men are created free and equal.


That no society of men can flourish unless members of that society are endowed with the opportunities and privileges of freedom.


Added words would be superfluous. Pi Lam has its Rod Max, and now he's the world's, left to succeed with a foundation that can do nothing else but.





## SERVICE . . .

While Pi Lambda Phi is better noted in the fields of scholarship and athletics, our service program is strong and well-rounded.

The Lammies kicked off the current service year with a "Help Me Get Wrecked" car smash last spring. At ten cents a whack, two old cars were demolished and the fraternity contributed \$100 to the Gator Loan Fund to provide more scholarships to the University of Florida. This fall we sold \$250 worth of small plastic megaphones called "gator growlers," proceeds going to the Suniland Training Center.

The Lammies teamed up with sororities on two occasions to bring holiday parties to underprivileged children. DPhiE joined us for a Halloween party to entertain Gainesville's foster children, and AEPhi helped us give Baby Gator Nursery children a Christmas party. Clothes and toys donated by Gainesville merchants were handed out to the kids.

Service chairmen Bruce Swiren and Norm Morris scheduled several discussion sessions with Gainesville leaders and instituted an encounter sensitivity group in February. Distinguished speakers in the program included representatives of the black student movement in November, Rabbi Munson of the Hillel Foundation in December, Dr. Father Gannon of the Catholic Student Center, and Barbara Eisenstadt of the "Corner Drug Store" in January.

Pi Lam has sponsored a little league comprised of over 100 welfare children from the Kennedy Homes. Brothers Dave McGriff, Shelly Stevens, and Rod Max organized the kids into eight teams, and other brothers are lending their coaching talents.

Finally, the brothers engaged in community religious services. During Pi Lam Sunday we went to the Catholic Student Center to serve as ushers, and we also conducted services at the Hillel Foundation on a Friday night.

While Pi Lam service projects have in the past been few and far between, we are striving to establish a service program more relevant to the brotherhood and the community. This is the first year that service has played an integral part of Pi Lambda Phi's activities. We believe that it will continue to develop as one of the most important areas of fraternity life.





Pi Lam, which has been traditionally weak in swimming, nevertheless made a respectable showing in the Orange League meet. Wayne Paasch and tanker captain Mark Dorn snared their places in the breaststroke and freestyle events, respectively.

The bowlers had a fair season at the Reitz Union lanes. Mark Yaeger, "Crowned Prince of Pins," headed up a team consisting of Rick Goldberg, Neal Lubow, Lee Bukstel, and Marc Gordon.

As football rolled around, the Lammies were seeded number one! Pi Lam had the nucleus of a winning team with all-campus quarterback Herb Appel and end Tony Dobies, among others. In pre-

season play, Pi Lam went undefeated and was scored upon only three times in a game where low scores are a rarity. But on the day preceding their first Orange League battle, the Lammies received their greatest setback of the entire athletic year — Appel was declared ineligible because of a technicality in the rules. This did not quell our aspirations. Delta Tau Delta proved to be a pushover as fine defensive play by "Mad Stork" Levi, Mike Segal, and Charles Stampelos bought the Lammies a 19-6 victory. Beta Theta Pi was next; then Pi Lam received its second biggest blow — Dobies was unable to play because of an injury. The Betas edged us 20-18. In the following game, quarterback Danny Herman and receivers Bob Schack and Alan Leventhal put on a dazzling offensive display to beat Lambda Chi. While the Lammies were winning, the Betas were losing, and the situation brought on a play-off to decide the bracket championship. Again, the Betas triumphed. Although disappointed by the year's football fortunes, several Pi Lams received all-campus mention.

Handball is always a strong sport for Pi Lam, but bad luck in the opening draw of the season matched us with powerhouse ATO. Captain Randy Coverman juggled his singles and doubles teams to produce a winning combination, but the ATOs overcame. Fine play by Wonda Bergsman, Les Forster, Al Levi, Irwin Adler, Marc Gordon, and Coverman almost succeeded in effecting an upset.

Shocked by an opening loss to the TEPs, Pi Lams cagers bounced back to beat the Fijis 33-25. The starting five for the Lammie basketball team consisted of Mitch Heller, Ron Blumstein, Rick Goldberg, Dave Kalish, and Sandy Kaufman. Despite its second loss of the season to Lambda Chi, the team showed much promise, and, incidentally, fared better than any Pi Lam team in years.

The Lammies, hanging on to a fifth place in the Orange League, stand a chance to take the whole hog, as the top houses are separated by only a narrow point margin.

Other sports remaining to be played look good for the Lammies. The track team, led by Steve Bergsman, should stand a chance of taking the championship. And the golf team, organized by Randy Baron, has recruited two second quarter pledges in the persons of Bob Eanett and Tom Tibor. Mike Lehrner and Charles Stampelos have promised to return to the fairways.

Pi Lam should offer stiff competition in softball. With experience, talented rookies, and new strategy, the team will be much improved. And with the likes of Les Forster, Herb Appel, and Russ "Big Stick" Klepper, the season should be an exciting one. Pi Lam should also be strong in tennis, five of last year's seven starters returning.




### ALLEN LEVI -

# Pi Lam Takes Fifth Straight to Clinch Nosebowl Trophy

The Pledge Class of 1969 wallopped the TEP's pledges 18-12 to give Pi Lam its most decisive Nosebowl victory in a decade. The win provided us with a 10 to 6 game edge on the TEPs in the traditional rivalry. This allowed us to permanently retire the cherished Nosebowl trophy.

The well-rounded Pi Lam pledge team was coached by Al Levi and the ever-amazing Tony Dobies, with help from brothers who have played in the Nosebowls of past years. Their coaching and strategy paid off. Under watchful eyes, the "Baby Lammies" rapidly progressed through six weeks of vigorous practice. When game day arrived, the pledges were truly a unified, highly-polished football team.

The very next set of plays saw the Goldberg-to-Harton combination click for another tally, making it 12-6 Pi Lam's favor. The half ended with the score unchanged.

Pi Lam started the second half off with a bang. Defense interrupted another TEP pass, and offense converted the advantage into another touchdown. Goldberg connected with Mitch Heller for Pi Lam's third aerial scoring strike. With the extra point attempt aborted, the Lammies held a commanding 18-6 lead.

The TEP pledges bounced back with a 50 yard bomb play to make the game a little tense. With only a few minutes remaining, the TEPs trailed by only one TD.

The last minutes of the game were nerve-wracking, but a determined Pi Lam defense held the fired-up TEP's scoreless. Don Walton dropped the quarterback behind the line of scrimmage for a loss from which they would not recover.

When the clock ran out a few plays later, the Pi Lams were on top 18-12. The Pledge Class of 1969 had exemplified the decisive winning spirit of Pi Lambda Phi.
