"T hat all men are created free and equal.


T hat no society of men can flourish unless members of that society are endowed with the opportunities and privileges of freedom.

# ALLEN LEVI & The New Pledge Policy



Allen Levi graduated in December 1970, and when he left he had accumulated almost all the awards Pi Lambda Phi could have bestowed upon him. Receiving "Outstanding Senior Brother" and "Best Senior Athlete" is quite an accomplishment, but Allen did just that.

Now we, the staff of the PEARL, wish to honor him once more be dedicating this year's annual to him.

In a sense, however, we are honoring an idea established by Allen - Pi Lam's new pledge policy. The policy is a new concept in pledging, appropriately entitled "Pledges are People." Briefly, it is a no-hazing pledge policy, which has made Pi Lam's brand of fraternalism more relevant. And, as a direct result, we are growing steadily while other fraternities are dying.

The following is the full text of that pledge policy.

Pi Lambda Phi is ready to progress along with the times. In view of the serious nature of the world today, we have found through our summer rush that the incoming freshmen this year are more mature than those of even last year. Hence, we feel that liberal changes are the only possible recourse to this situation.

In making these changes, Pi Lam considered why a bright young freshman (or sophomore, or junior) who has met the entrance requirements of the University of Florida should be expected to enjoy a role in which his fraternal status is second class

Therefore we have taken the following steps to insure that our future pledges receive a fraternity education, not a fraternity training.


- There shall be NO SUBSERVIENT ACTIVITIES. That includes no physical or mental hazing.
- Pledge tasks and pledge work sessions shall be replaced by chapter work sessions involving both brothers and pledges.
- 3. Pledges may attend a major portion of all chapter meetings.
- 4. Pledges are included in chapter committees and will be represented on the executive council through a member of their own calss.
- Pledges are in no way subservient to brothers and discipline of pledges is handled within the same framework of laws and policies which govern all members.

Pi Lam believes that this concept of fraternity education will appeal to students who are interested in the fraternity experience but who are unwilling to subject themselves to the lengthy, immature, and time-consuming activities which traditionally characterized fraternity pledgeship.

Pi Lambda Phi is meeting the challenge of a rapidly changing society and is emphasizing that pledges are people. In making your final decision, see which house will treat you as a person, not a pledge. Pi Lam is a house of people!

An idea has pushed Pi Lam far ahead of the rest. So what could be more fitting than to honor that idea and the man who conceived it? And while the tributes are being paid, here is a salute to the open-minded brotherhood that listened and grasped this challenge.

To Allen Levi we extend our thanks.

Florida's Attorney General

The PEARL takes pride in honoring Brother Robert L. Shevin, Attorney General for the State of Florida.

Shevin's list of good leadership is long. As a member of Florida Delta (1951-55) his credentials include Rex, member of Blue Key, Cabinet Secretary of the student government and Southern Collegiate Debate Champion.

He was president of the Student Bar Association while a law student at the University of Miami.

Brother Shevin was first elected to the Florida Legislature in 1964 and was voted the most outstanding first-term representative. In

1966 he was voted into the Upper House where he gathered numerous other awards from Florida's civic groups and newspapers due to his "Get Tough On Crime" stand, effective debating, and his handling of inter-governmental activities and "pursuit of good legislation".

Having been elected Attorney General in 1970 by the third highest percentage of votes cast in the general election, Robert Shevin has served Florida as a true statesman. He has led a bipartisan fight to resigter eligible voters, rid Florida of crime and fight for an effective educational and prison system.

For these reasons and many more, Pi Lam pauses to salute an alumnus who has served his society well.

Pi Lam is truly fortunate to have three such friendly and devoted people as a part of its Florida Chapter.





Sports do not comprise the sole activities of a Pi Lam. They are only one of the ingredients that goes into making a well rounded man.




Other events included a big brotherlittle brother "free-for-all at Shakey's Pizza Parlor, joint party with Phi Kappa




The largest pledge class in recent memory was immediately distinguished from previous pledge classes by a "Progressive Pledge" policy instituted by the forward thinking brothers. 


"Last Supper" is the low mark of fraternity cuisine.

# Fifth Straight Nose Bowl Won By Pi Lam's "Little Purple Gang"

Sharp passing and a muscle-tough defense gave the "Little Lammies" their fifth straight victory over the boys of Tau Epsilon Phi, by a 27-12 score.

Purple and Gold quarterback Norm McLeod completed four touchdown passes and hit on three extra points to pace the offense. Randy Fried caught two TD's and an extra point to lead the receiving corps, while Jim McPherson and Louis Lippman snagged one touchdown toss and an extra point each.

Other Pi Lam receivers, whose catches set up many of the touchdowns, were Richard Spiegel, Scott Lyons, Flip Schemer and Steve Sessler.

The "Doomsday Defense" (sorry Dallas) was led by the bearded inside line-backers Joe Mesler and Howie Farbish. Both intercepted one pass


along with Jake Cameron. Other starters on the defense were safeties Fried and McPherson, Jim Elterman at outside linebacker and Evan Byer at rushing position.

The little "Purple Gang", coached by Al Levi, Tony Dobies, Barry Myerson and Charles Stampelos, parlayed an interception by Cameron into a TD before the game was two minutes old. Fried caught that first touchdown to put Pi Lam ahead to stay.



# Come Together Day Bridges Today's Ga

t's hard to believe that a fraternity weekend service project gained national recognition, but Pi Lam man-

aged to do just that.

"Come Together Day", a Pi Lambda Phi presentation under the direction of brothers Neal Lubow, David McGriff and Shelly Stevens, was cited by Gainesville Mayor Perry McGriff, Jr. as a major reason for that city receiving "All-American City" honors this

Over 3000 Gainesville citizens crowded into the ROTC field, March 31, 1970. Blacks, whites, rich, poor, conservatives and liberals sincerely tried to close the communications gap through "earthy" conversation while enjoying an old time barbeque and listening to several bands volunteering their time.

The day's speakers, including government, religious and ethnic notables stressed the theme of harmony and peace surpassing all classes and back-

grounds.

The Lammies hit on this idea after several weeks of community service with the underprivileged kids at Kennedy Homes. Every Saturday morning many of the brothers would go out to the housing project to organize recreation for the children. Softball and jump rope soon developed into a broader based idea and "Come Together Day" was conceived.

With the coming of Fall 1970, the brotherhood succumbed to the holiday spirit. Besides collecting food and clothes for the underprivileged, Pi Lamteamed up with Delta Phi Epsilon sorority to throw a Christmas party for 50 children from Carver Homes. The Lammies provided their own "naturally plump" Santa Claus, (Glenn Tobin) who handed out a toy to each child. The toys were collected from Gainesville merchants.

Service chairman Leon Azis also scheduled a series of diversified afterdinner speakers including: Mayor McGriff, past Pi Lam Rex and UF Professor Herb Schwartz and representatives from the Campus Crusade For Christ.


Individual brothers are presently working with groups to establish programs with Gainesville's jails, the Corner Drug Store and poverty groups.

# Outstanding Senior




# 'Best Freshman' Award Earned by Two for 197'-71

In a special meeting, parents were informed about the house's financial stability and acquainted with fraternity life and its affect on their sons.


