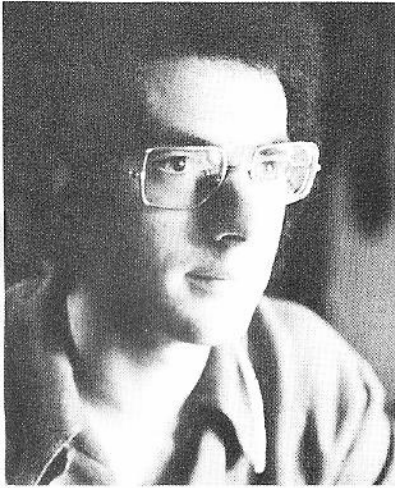
## The Brothers of Florida Delta

# LETTER FROM THE REX



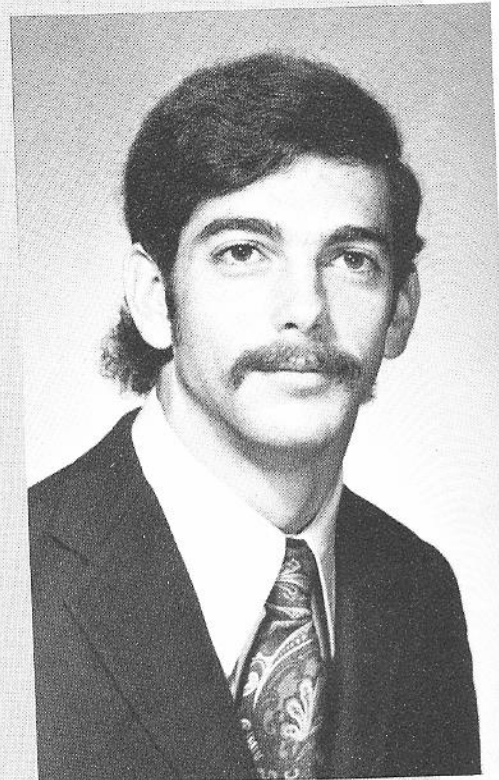

**Herman Paul:** Then-Pledge Class of 1954. Gator Swim Team. Varsity letterman. Now-Attorney. Married. One child.



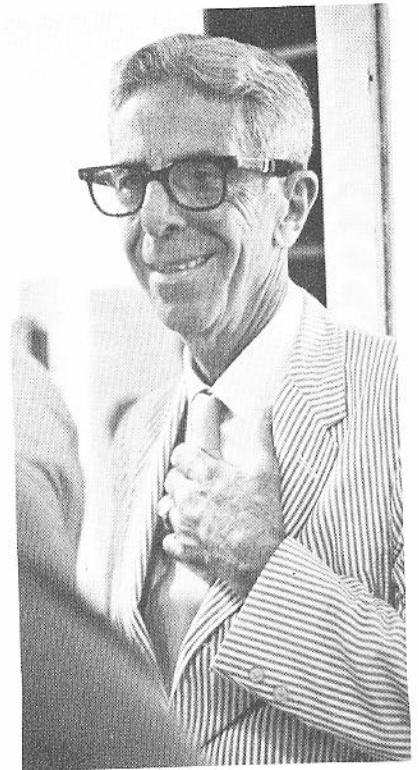
# Paul Marks: Helping Pi Lam Grow

We in Pi Lam thank "Dr. Zeus" for his sincere involvement and hope that his youthful insight continues to be an asset to our chapter.

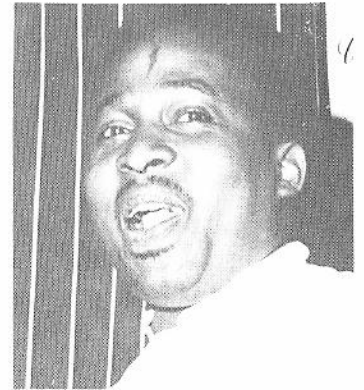
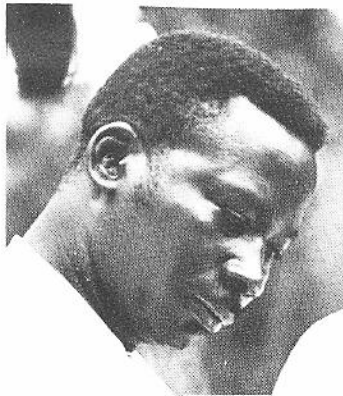






## Fred Jones, Brother and Advisor

## Scotty, Louise, and LeRoy

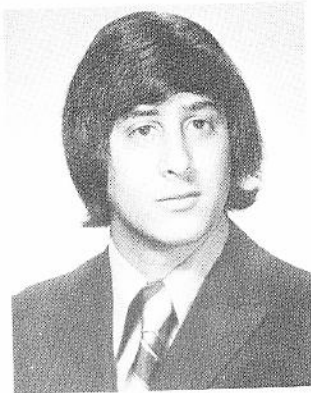
Appreciation is a relative term. When used in reference to Pi Lam's friendly employees, appreciation cannot ever be as fully expressed as it is felt.

Pi Lams feel that academic showing are as important to fraternity life as social or athletic events.

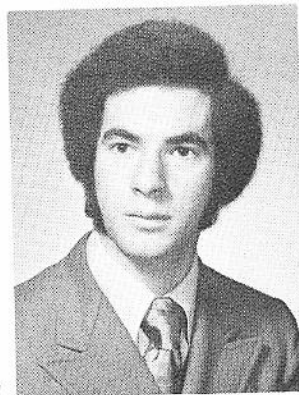

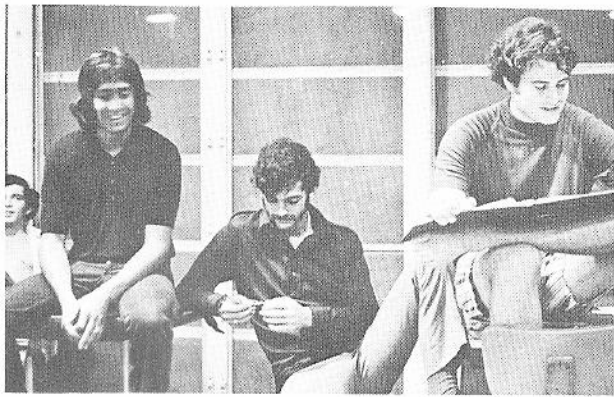

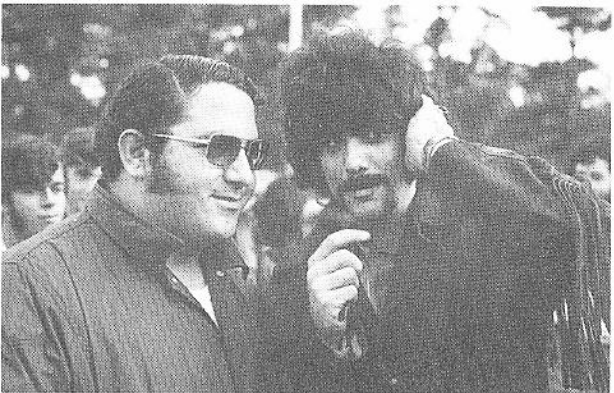
# BROTHERHOOD

## *The Bond That Stronger Grows*

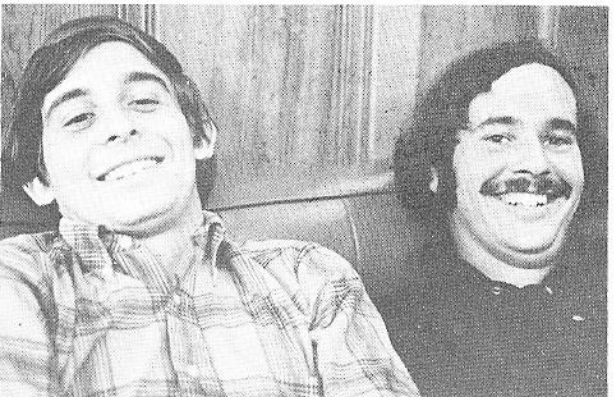

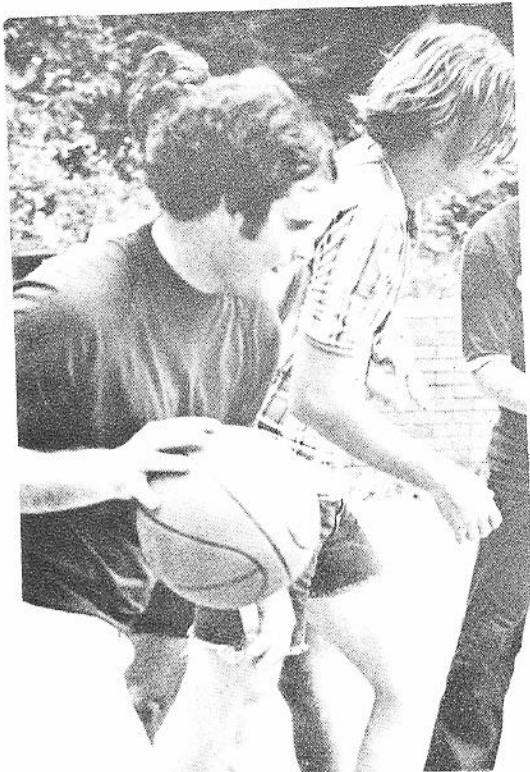

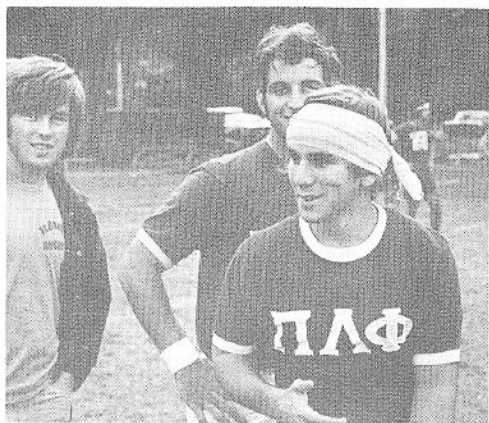

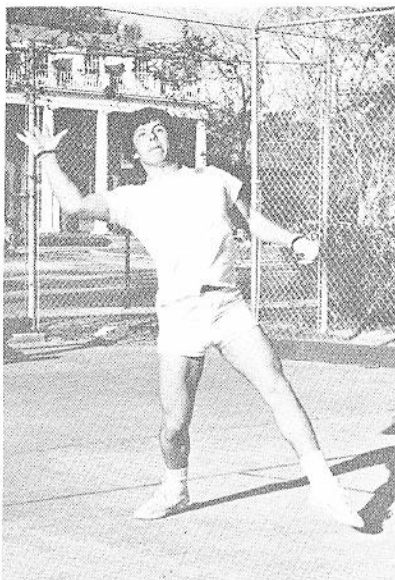

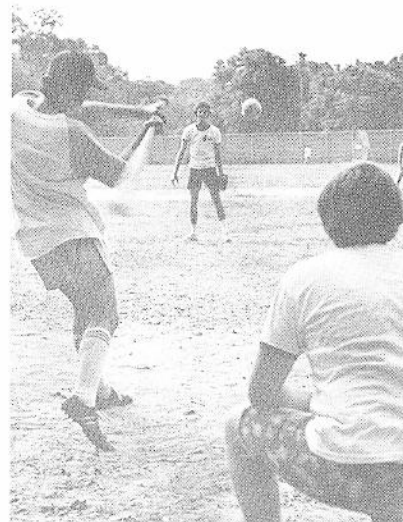

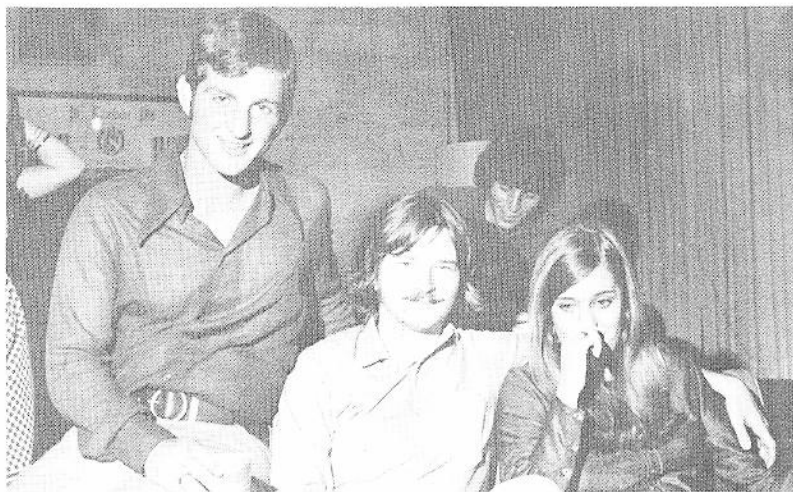

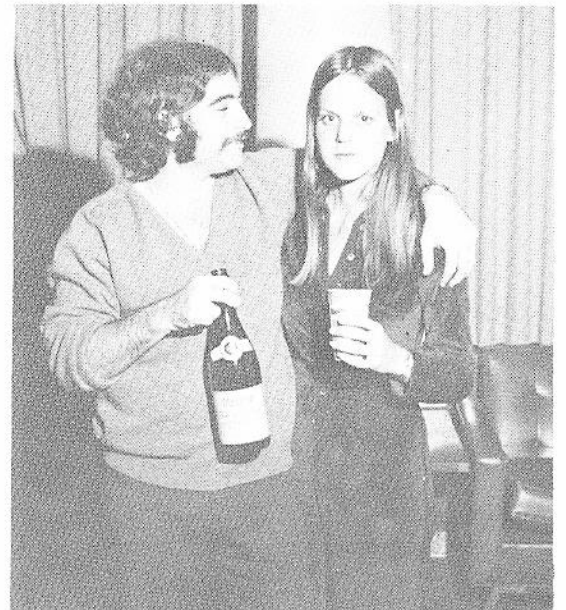

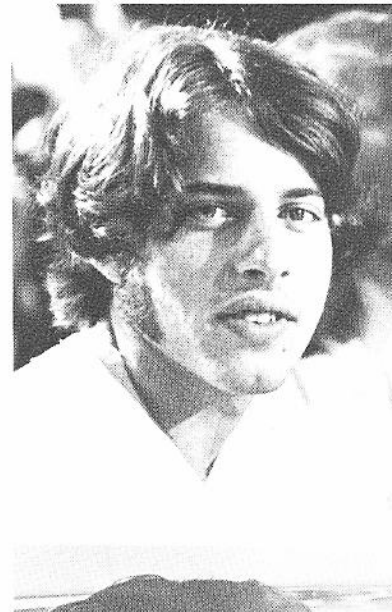

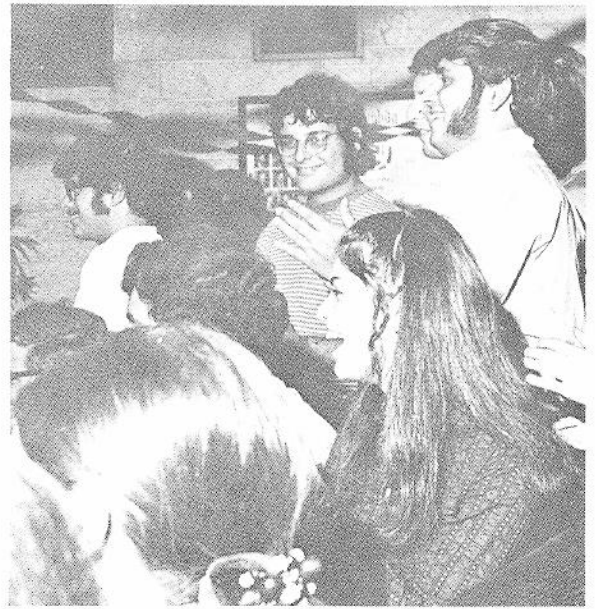

On November 21, the Pledge Class of 1971 played their Nose Bowl, and all like the teams before them, they came out as winners.

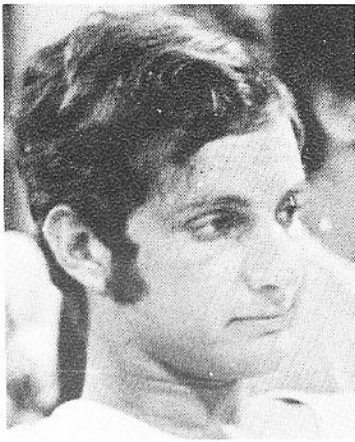

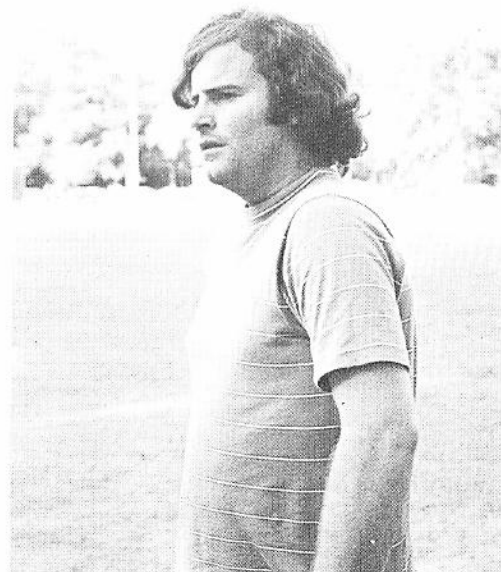
## Two Share Best Freshman Award For 1971-72

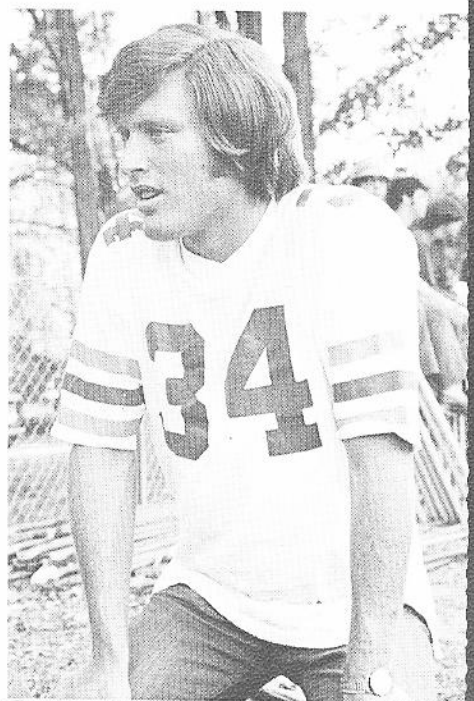
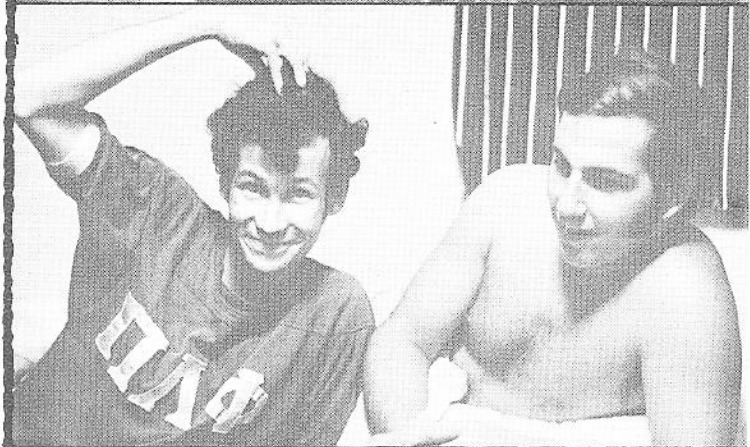
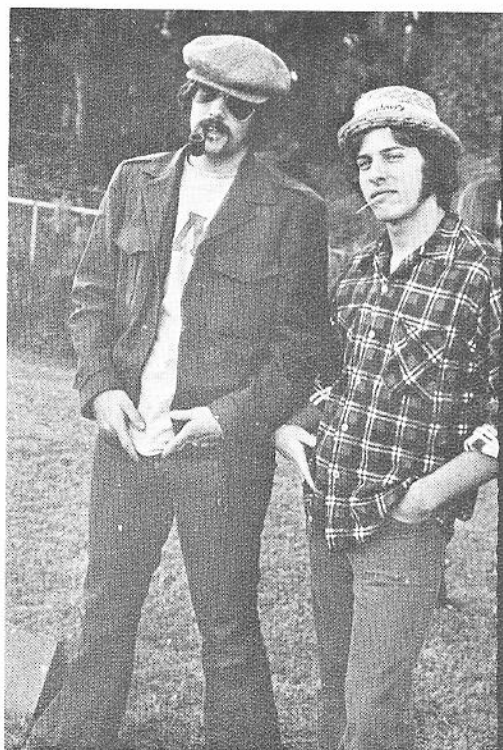
# LAMMIES PLAY HOST TO PARENTS
