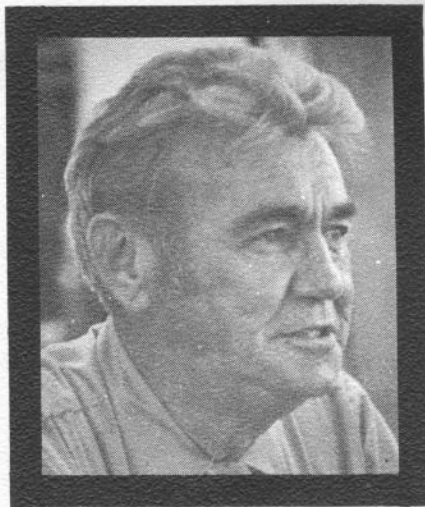

# LETTER FROM THE REX



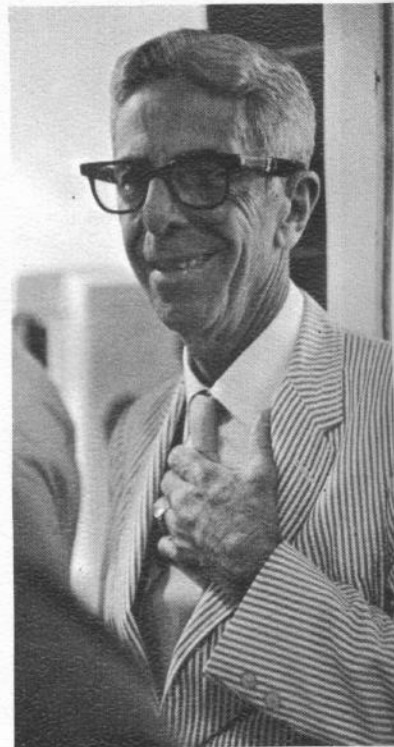
# Paul Marks: Pi Lam's Voice of Experience

# Dr. Stephen Feinstein: Our New Guiding Hand

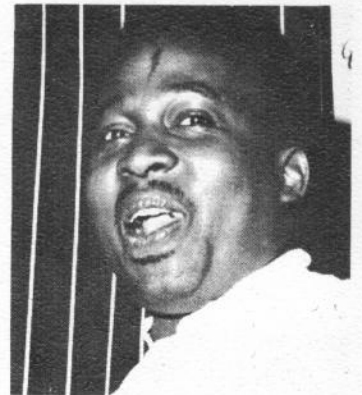

Appreciation is a relative term. When used in reference to Pi Lam's friendly employees, appreciation cannot ever be as fully expressed as it is felt.

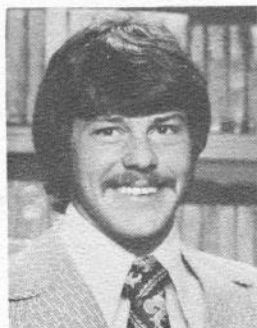

# The Spirit of Trust and Confidence

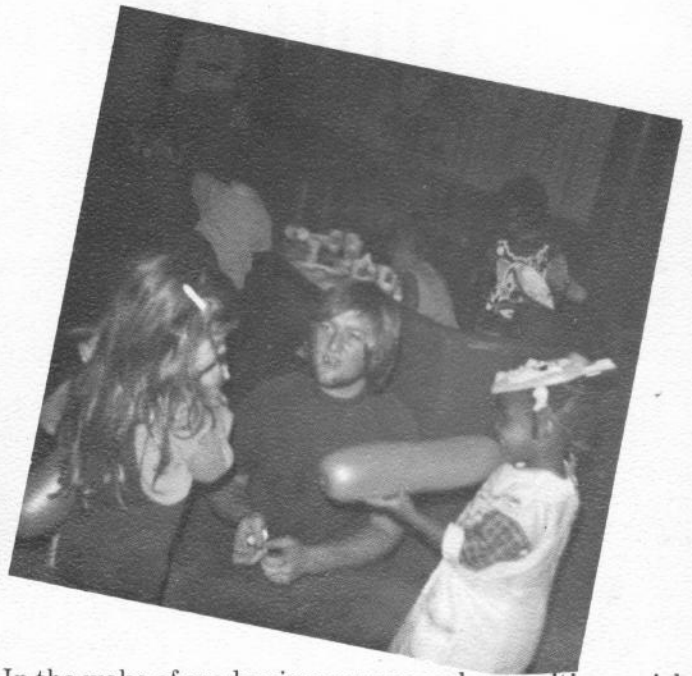
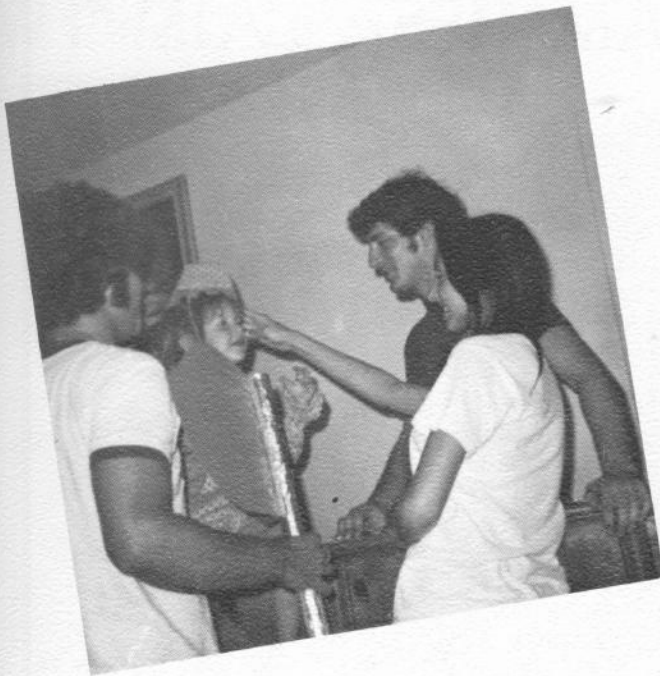

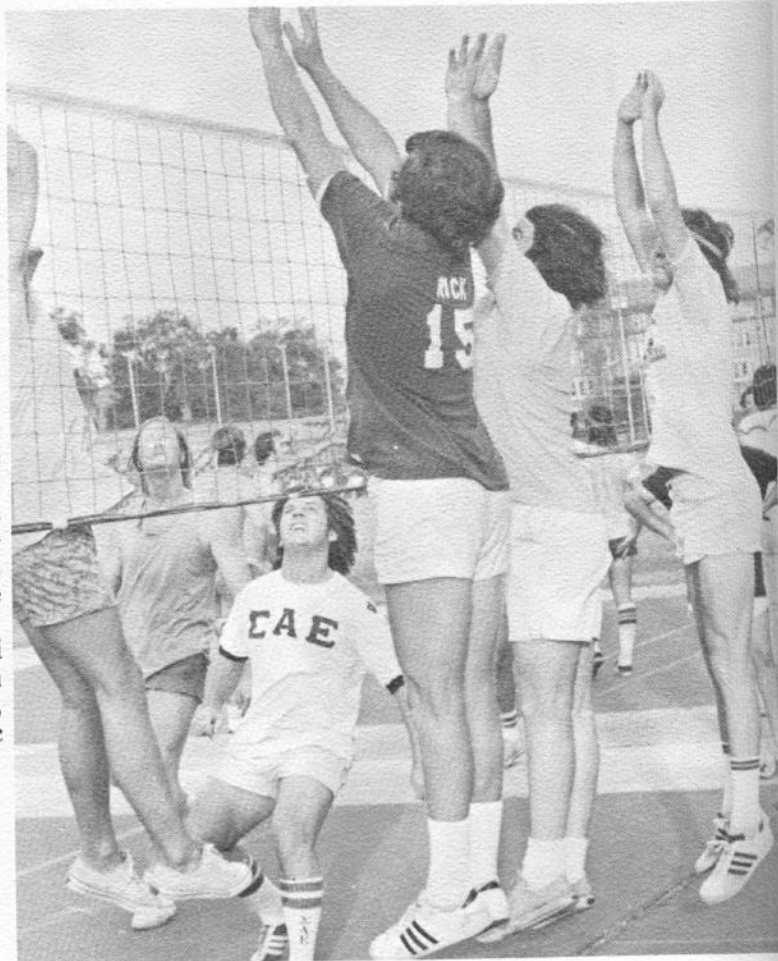

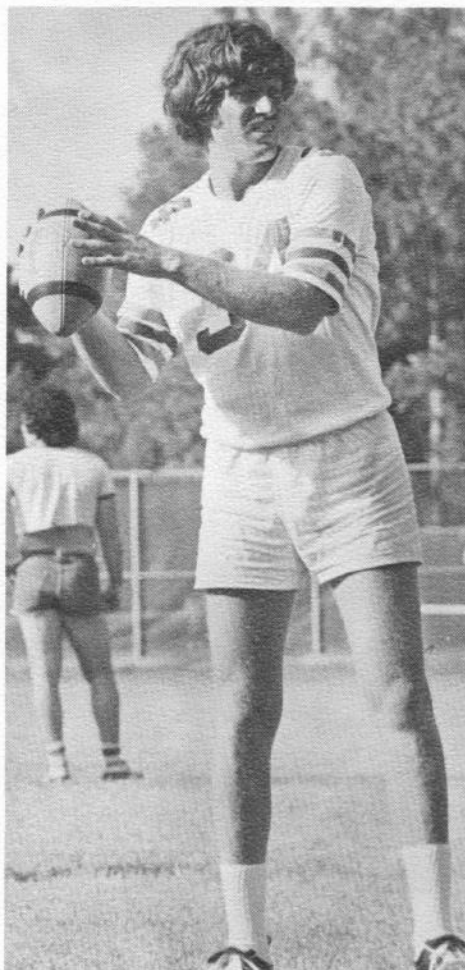
# TWO SHARE BEST SENIOR ATHLETE FOR 1972-73

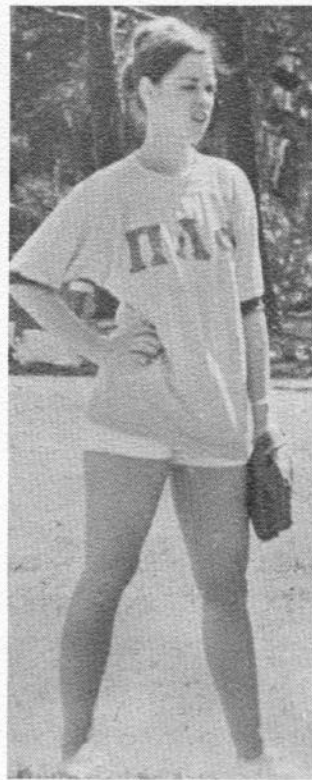

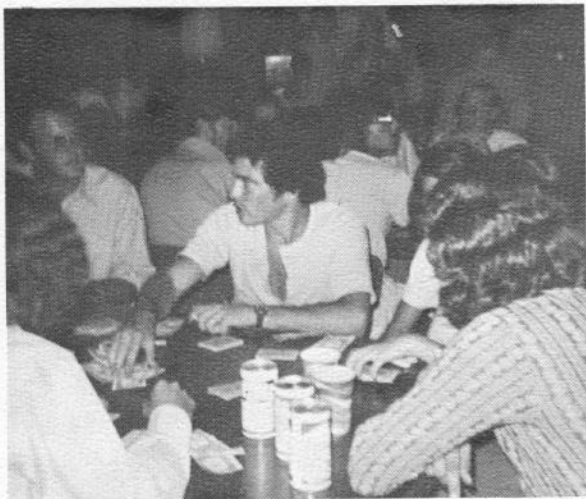

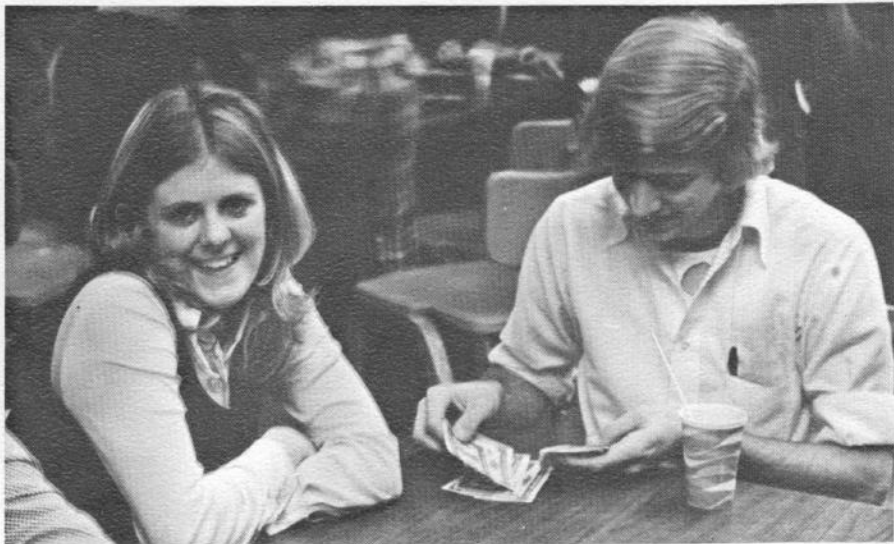
Two nights of non-stop entertainment awaited our parents this year at Parents' Weekend. In addition to getting a look at their sons again, they were treated to a memorable time.

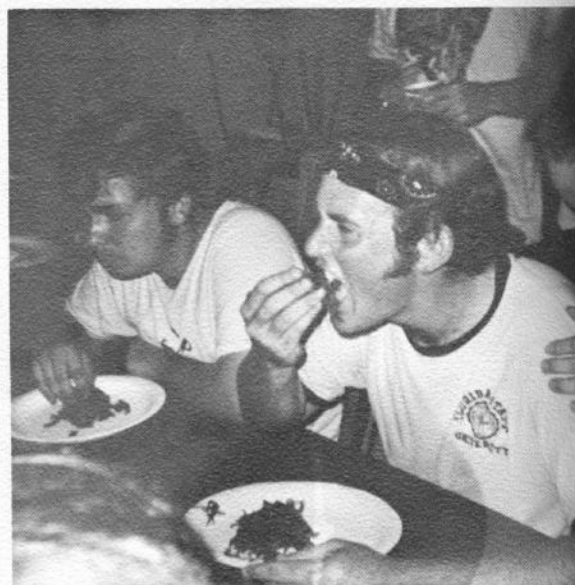
