



"BACKBONE OF PI LAM"


Paul Marks

There certainly is no one more welcomed at our house than "George". His friendly, casual attitude and capable management has made him a vital part of Pi Lambda Phi.



A strong showing in every sport and back to back Orange League titles in raquetball and bowling made 1973-74 a good year for Pi Lam atheltics.



With swimming, golf, tennis and softball on tap for Spring, Pi Lam appears headed for another spectacular season in athletics.


