







Letter from the Rex







Nosebowl '74








The Nosebowl is the premier event in the peldge program of Pi Lambda Phi, and is possibly the most valuable learning experience in which any young man might have the good fortune to participate. The Nosebowl is an excellent example of where the means are an end in themselves, a contest where preparation is the goal, and the score is displayed in the hearts and souls of the contestants. The Nosebowl is where a young man learns the magic of Pi Lambda Phi.

Character, and particularly fraternalism, are abstract thoughts and intangible entities that cannot be taught, but can only be learned and absorbed through cooperation, desire, and victory over physical and mental challenge. Fraternalism is exemplified by the devaluation of the ego (without losing self identity), the elevation of others, the unselfish drive to succeed together, and the raw-gut feeling of love between men. Character is steady composure during taxing times, mature and unrestrained elation during triumph, sober reflection during misfortune, and the sincere expression of pride through tears.

The Nosebowl is a two-hour-long football game of our pledge class versus that of Tau Episilon Phi, and is the display grounds of our months of tireless work. The pledge class of 1974 showed the fruits of their lessons, playing in the mold of true and faultless gentlemen with an inexhaustable drive motivated by the realization of the growing experience of the past two months. For some spectators, the thrill of the match ended shortly after our 25-12 victory, but for the Pi Lams, the electric feeling of the win was but a step towards the ultimate goal of brotherhood.


Scholarship

The Lammies pledged a continuing devotion to studies as the key to successful academic lives at the University of Florida in the years ahead.





Social








Alumni 1925-1975


. Concluding first quarter, Bob Merlin led the Pi Lam tracksters with a third place finish in the low hurdles.



Best Seniors


